



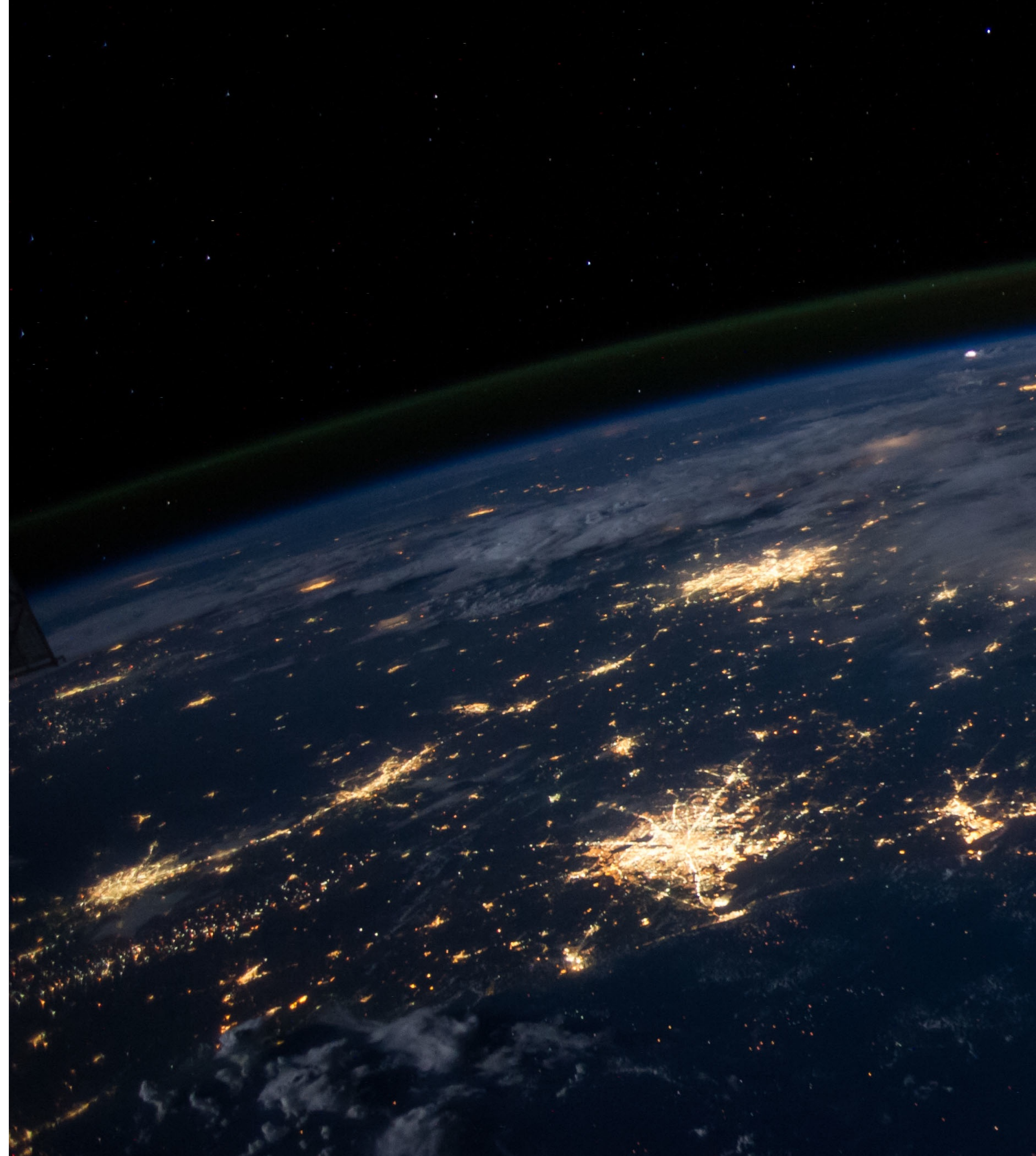

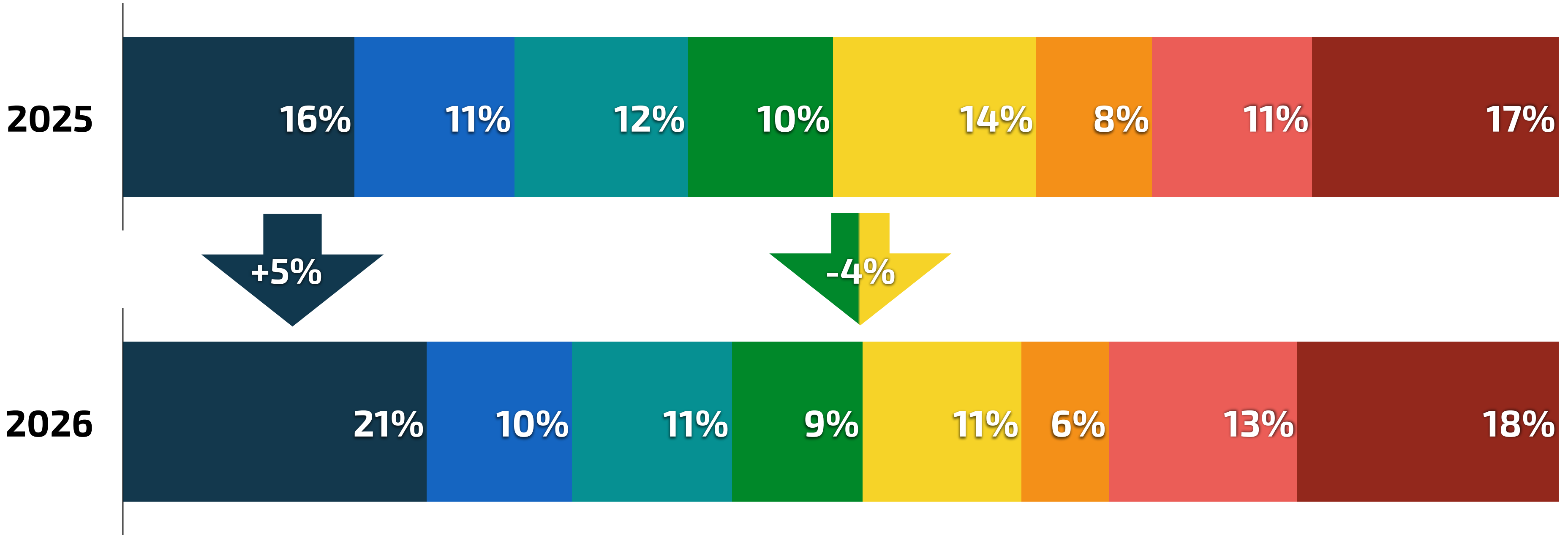


In the 2026 midterms, the left is growing and the center is shrinking

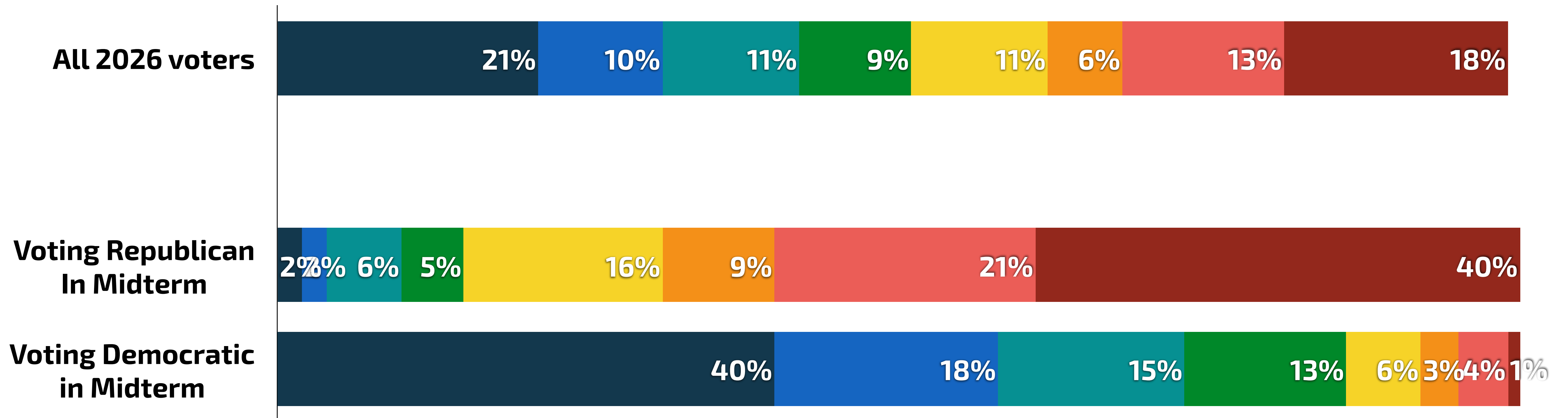

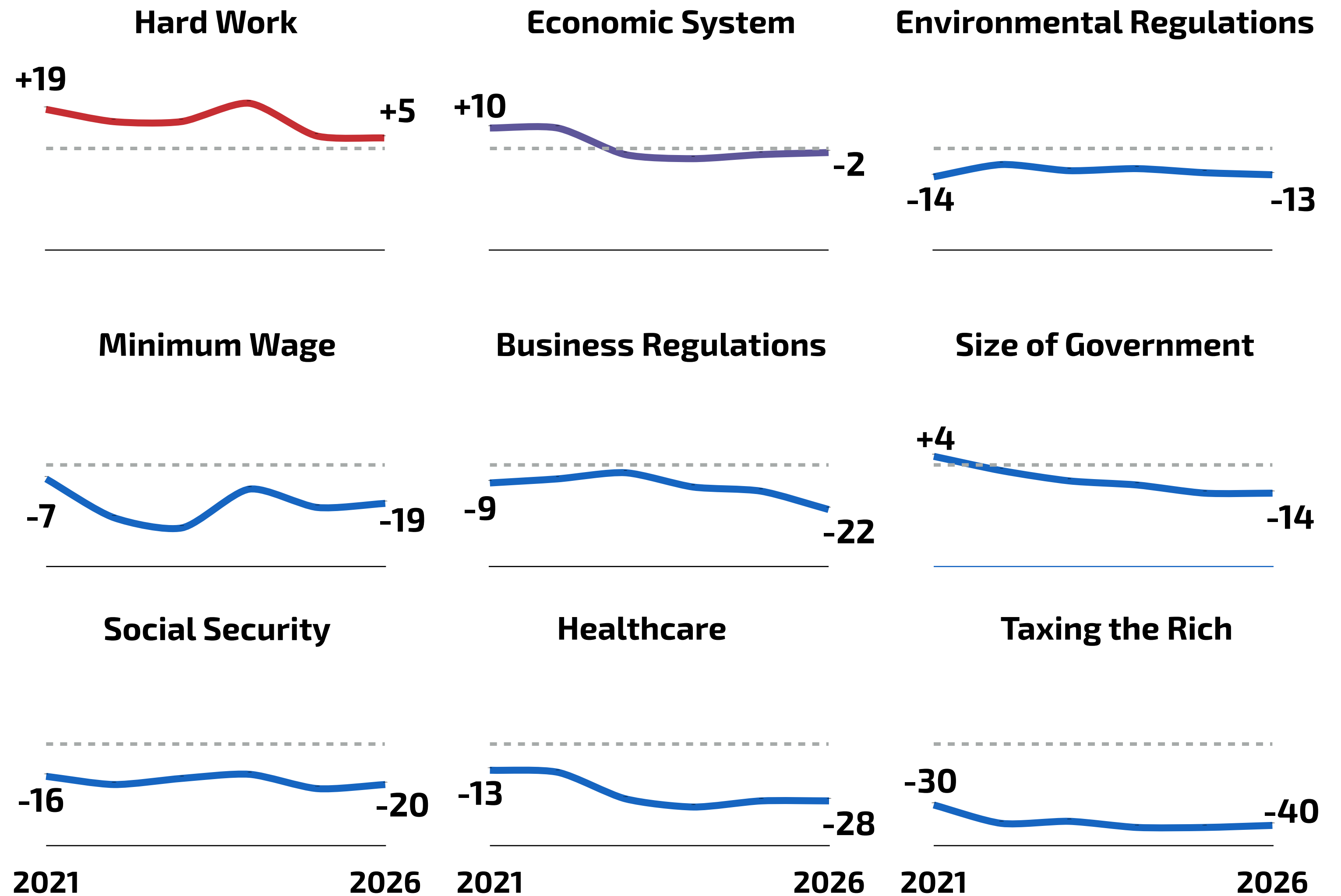

- Economic conservatism has stabilized after last year's collapse but has lost significant ground



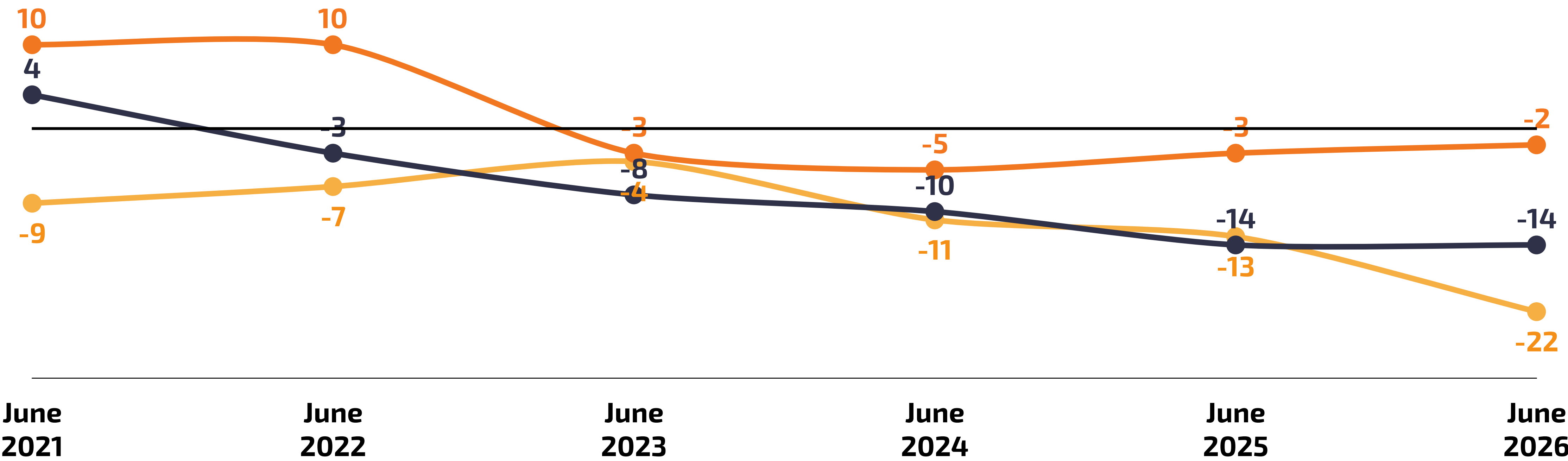

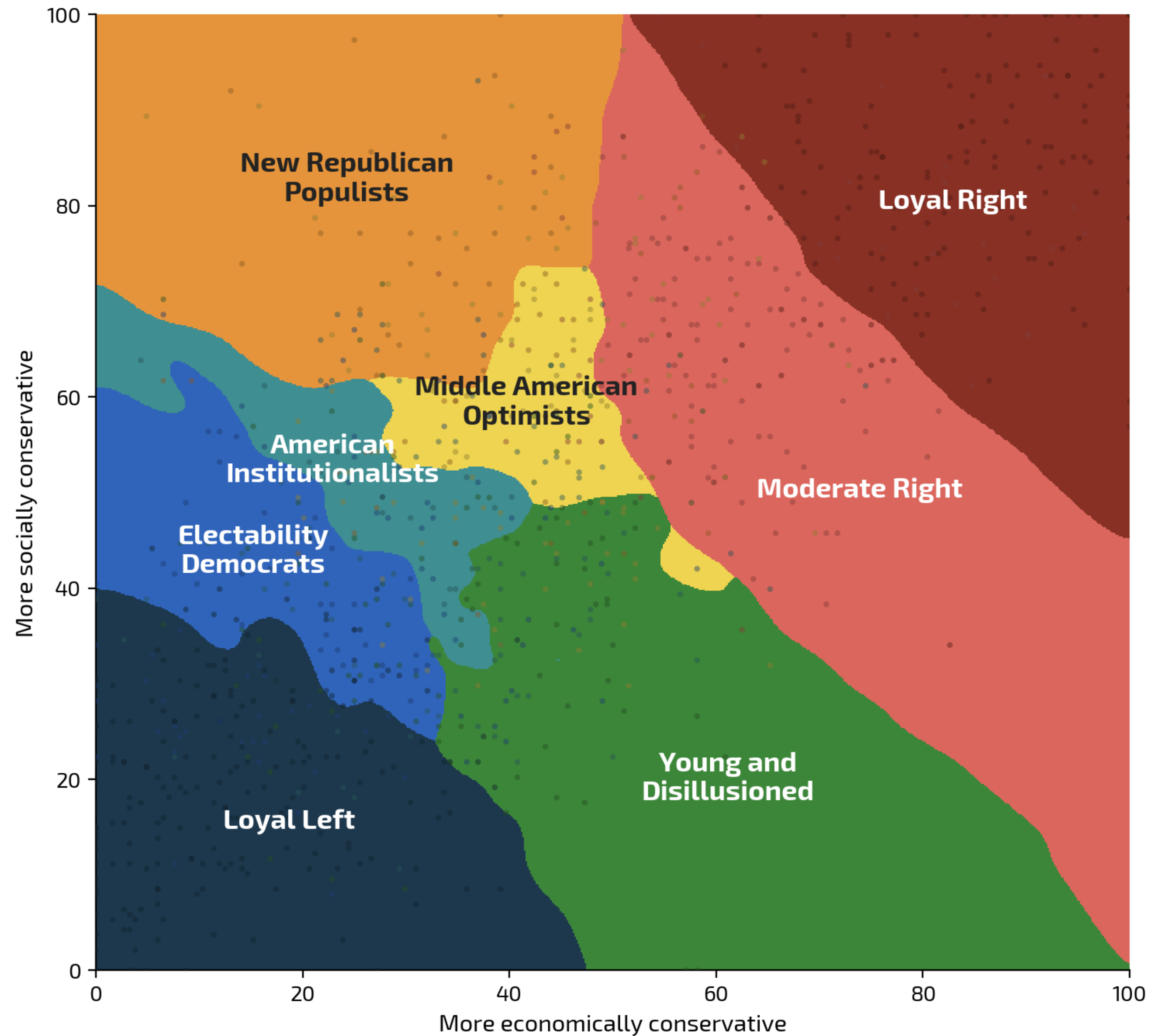

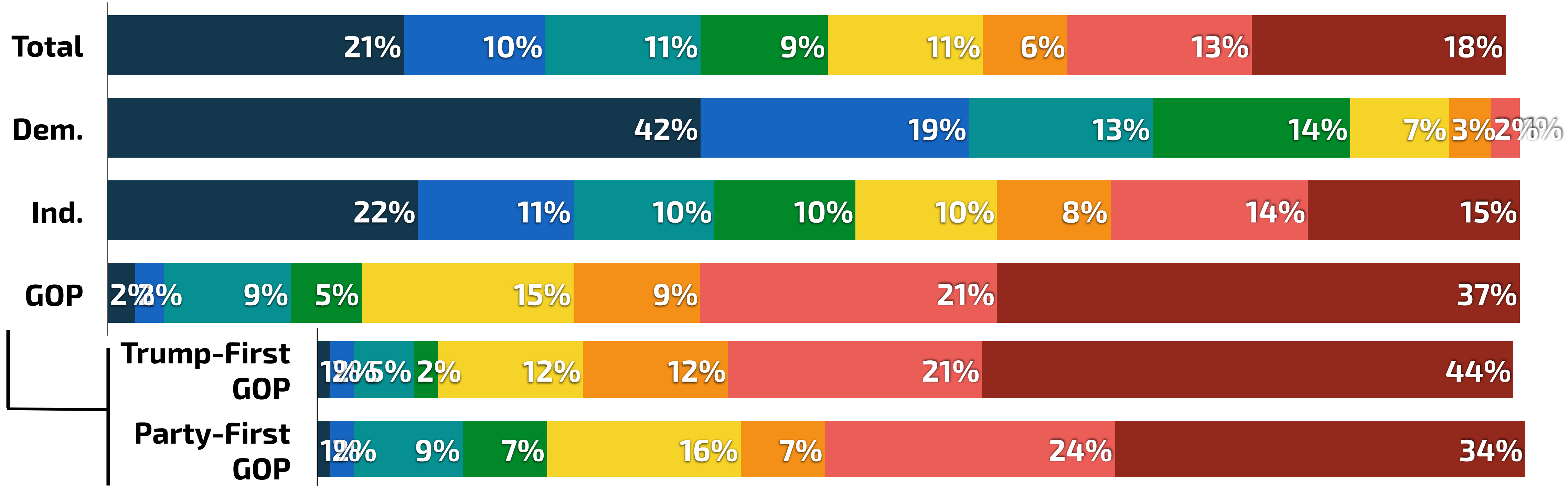
The middle is a shrinking island in a midterm

- In a midterm electorate, shrinking center means less mixed issue voters in the electorate.



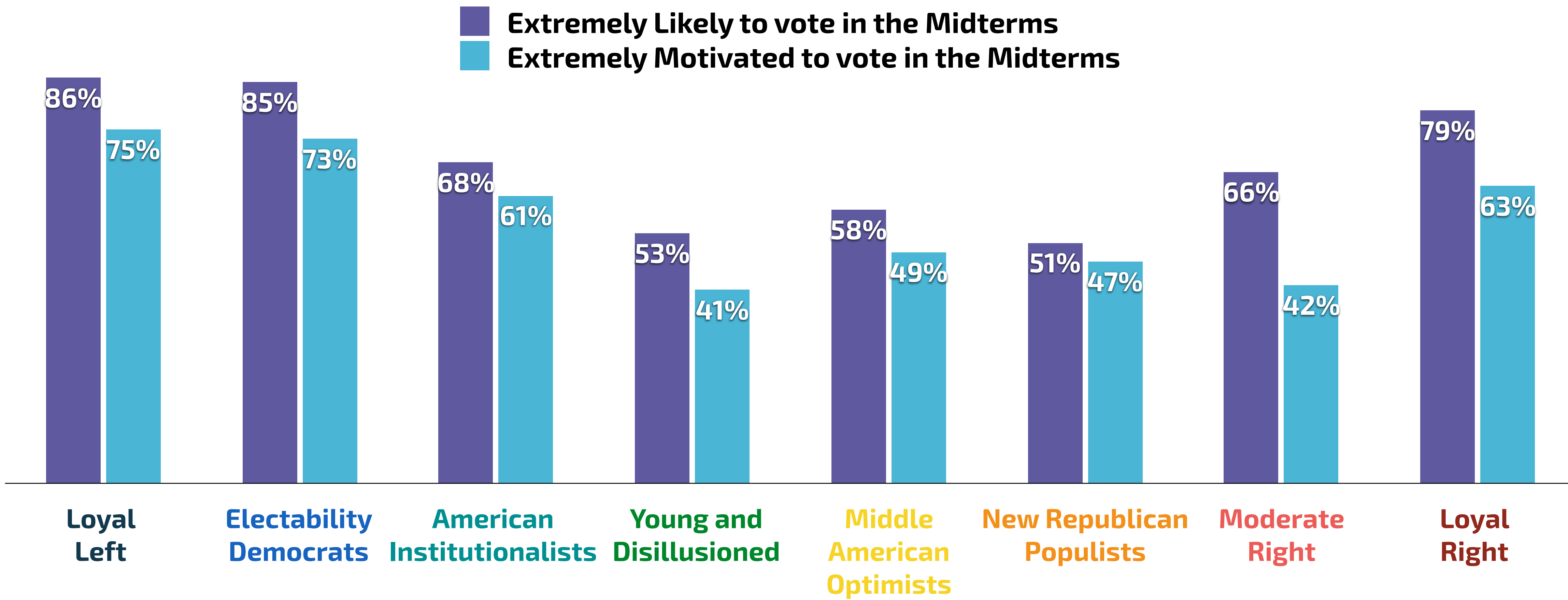

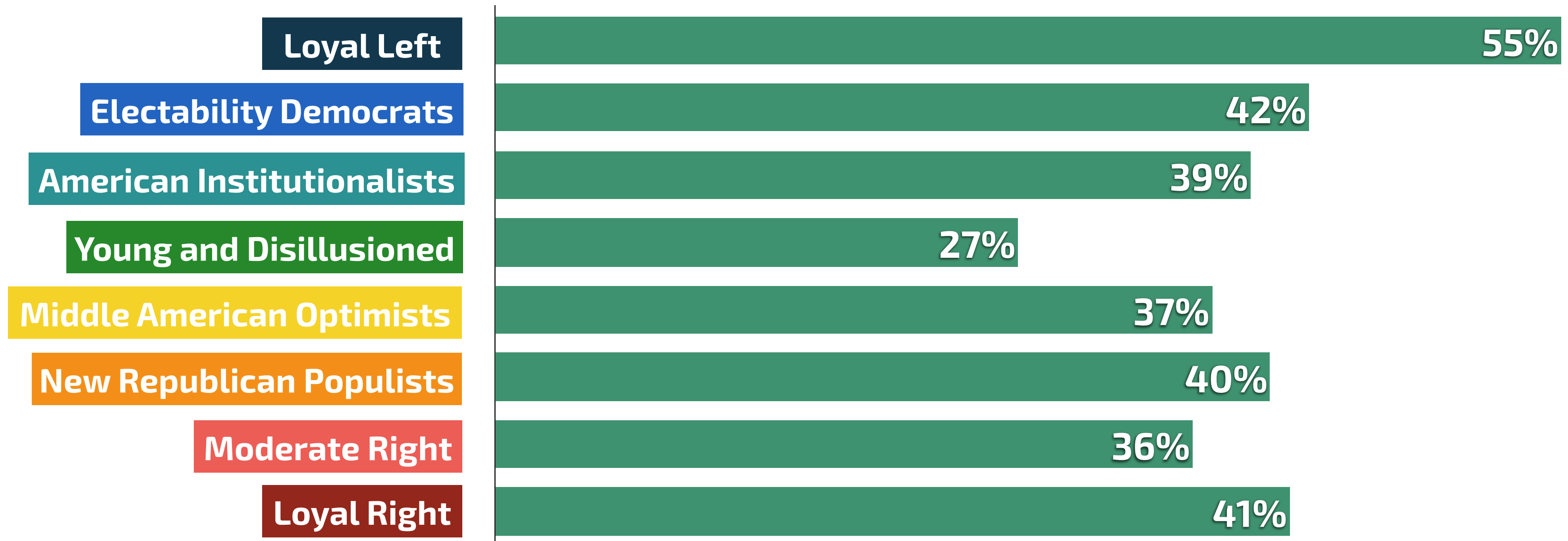

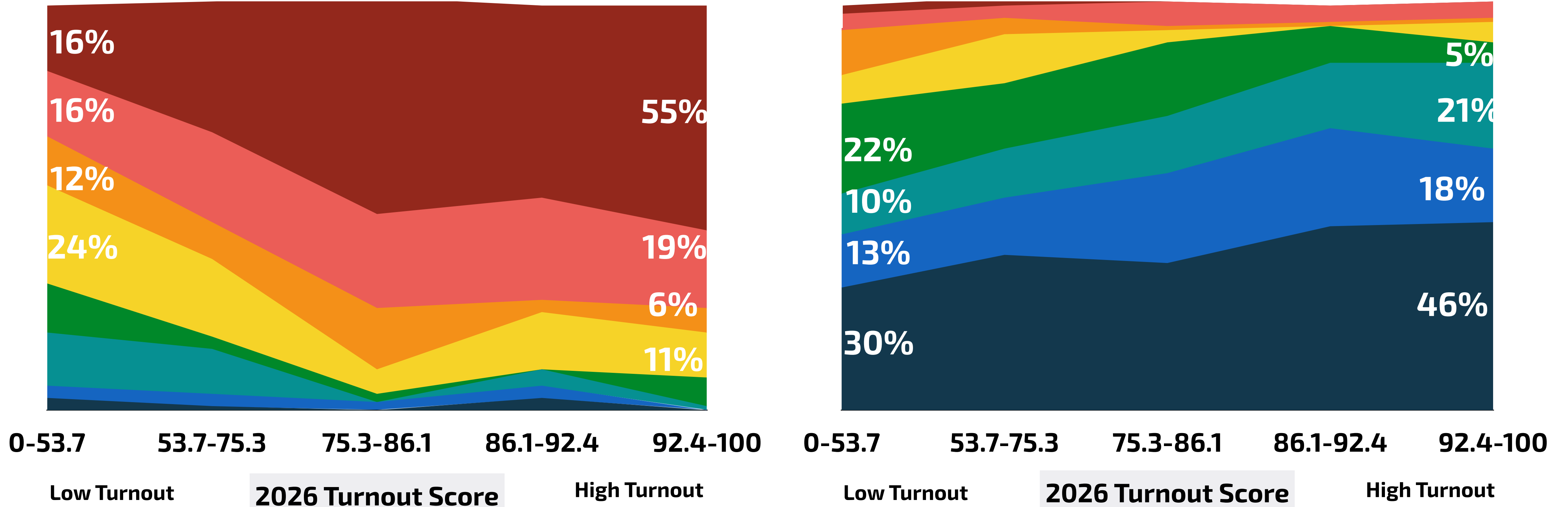

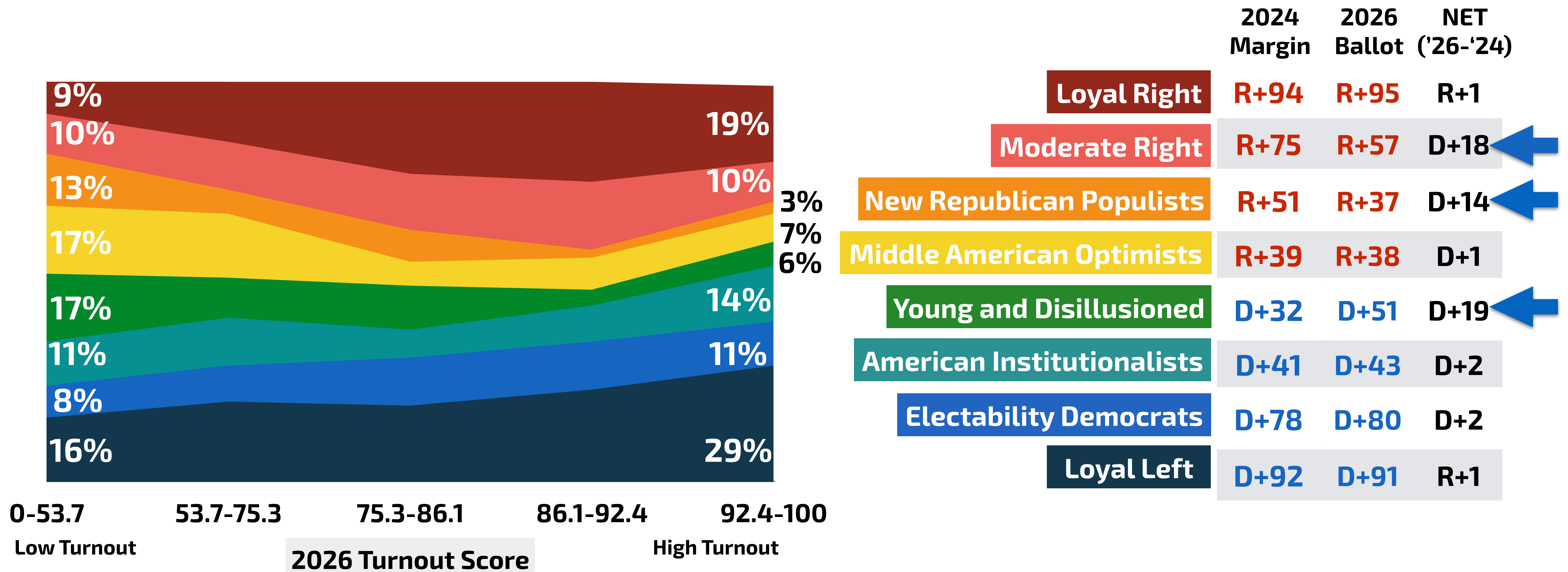

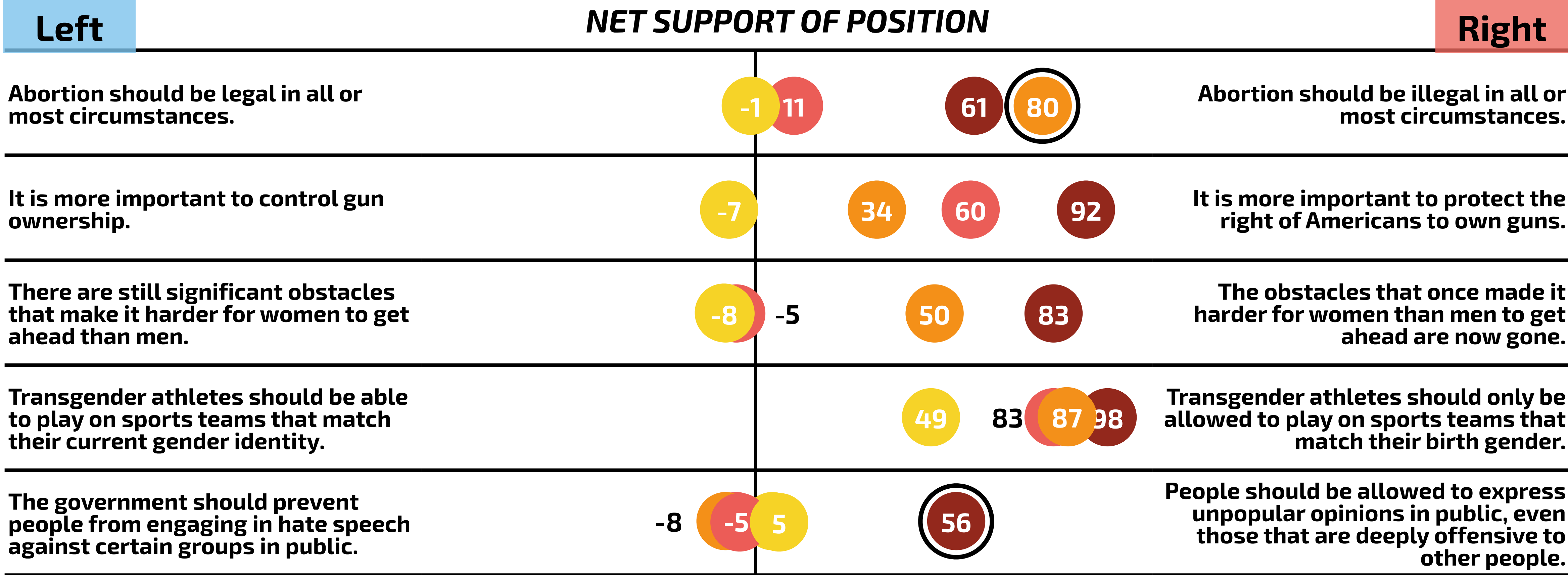

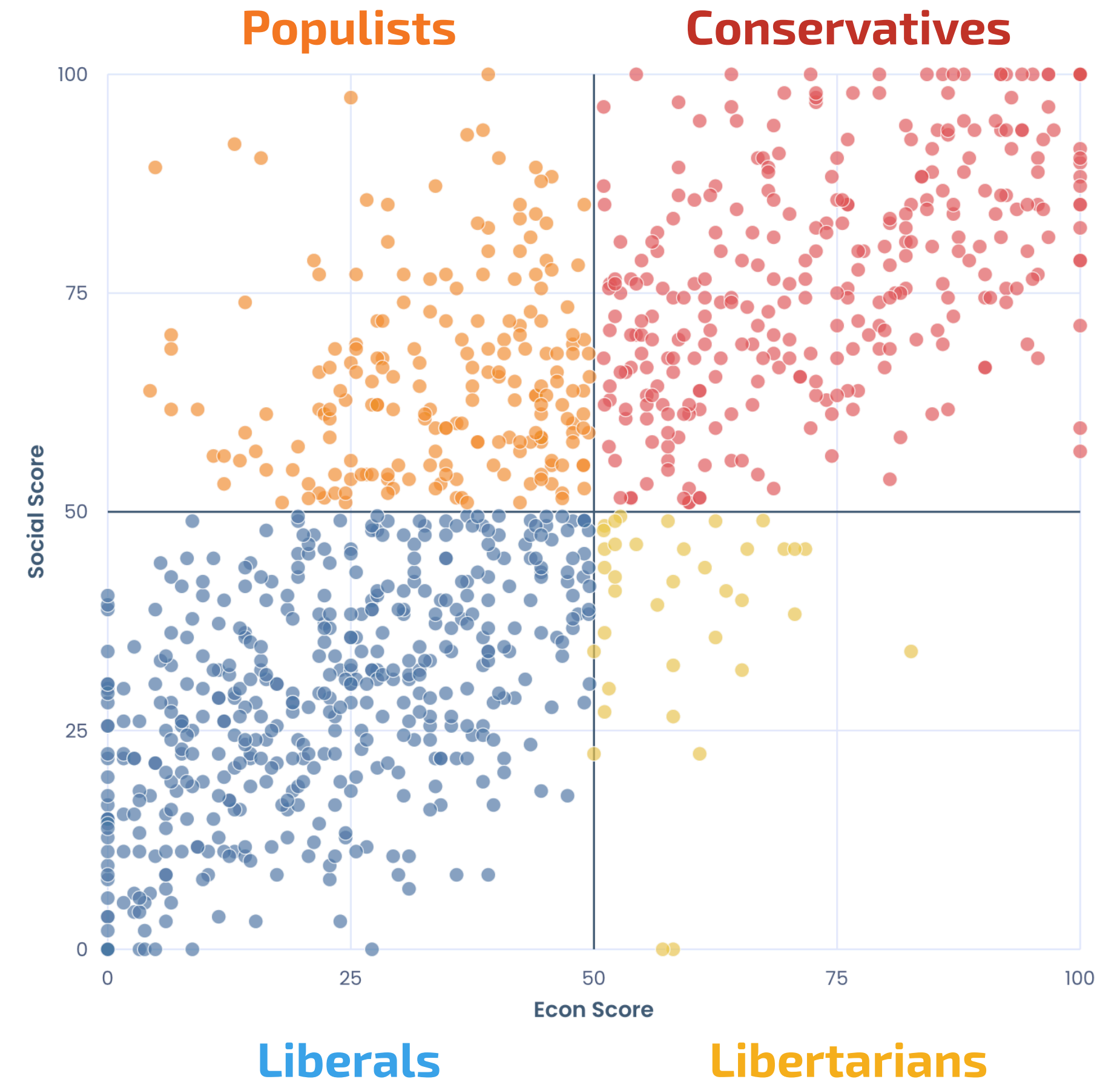

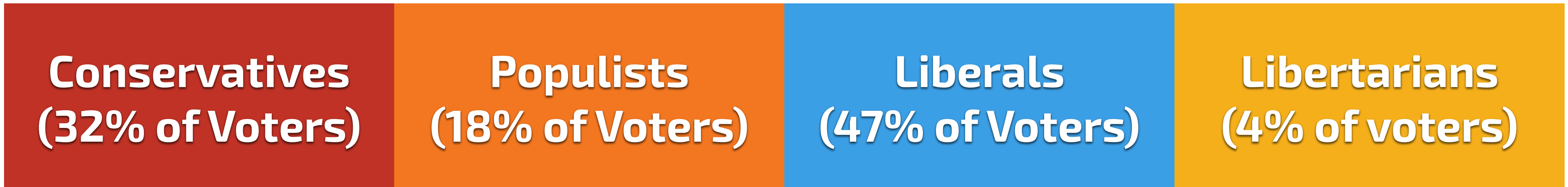

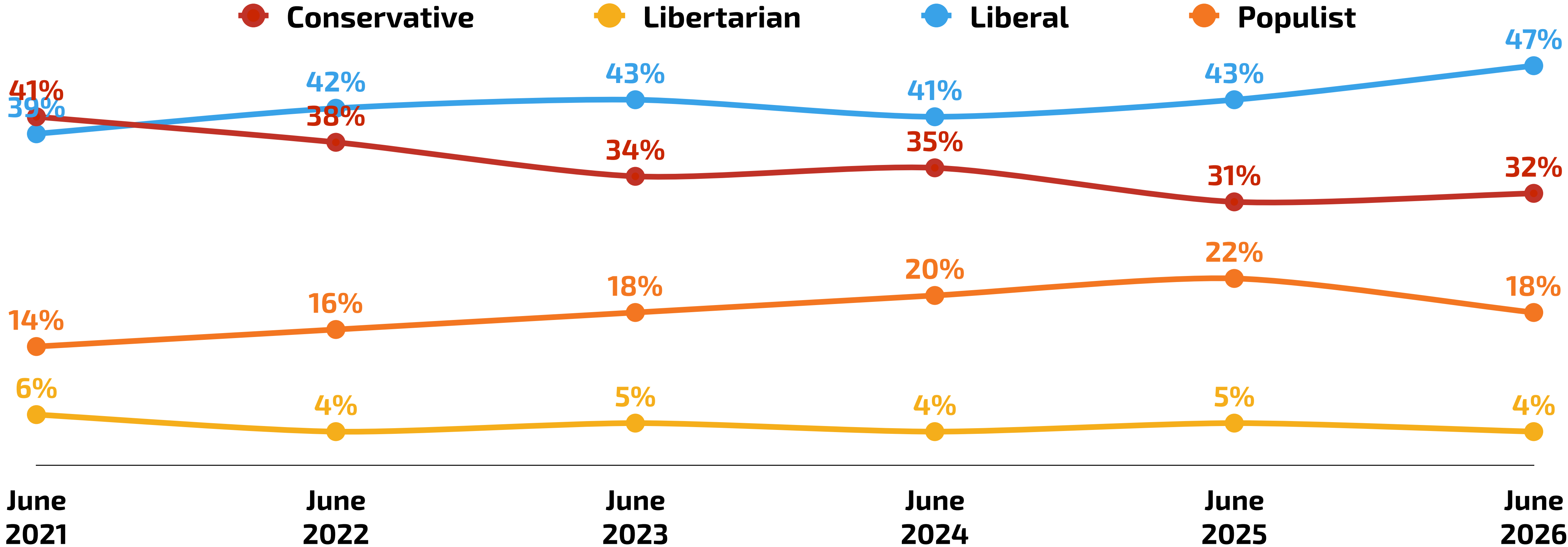

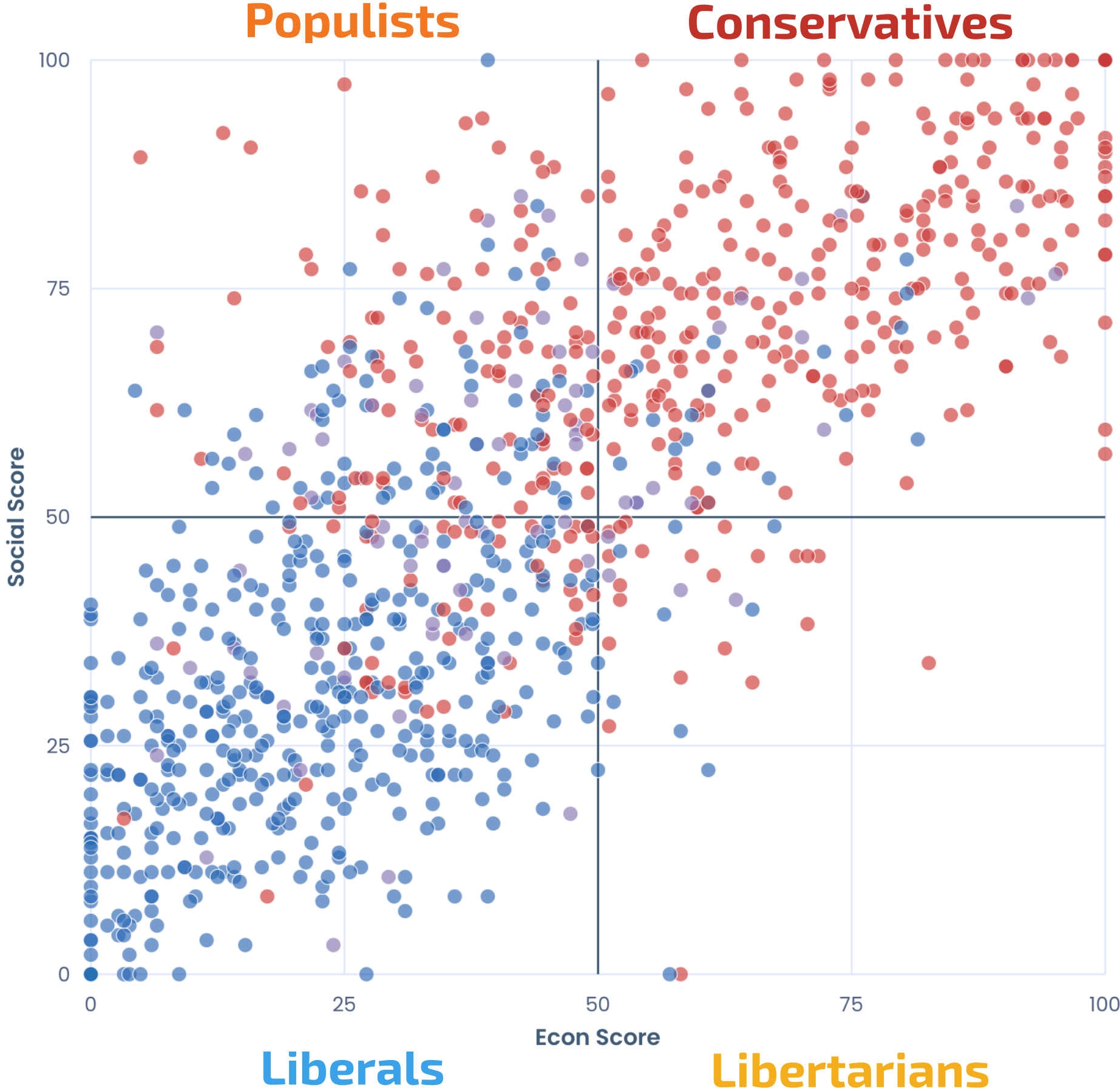

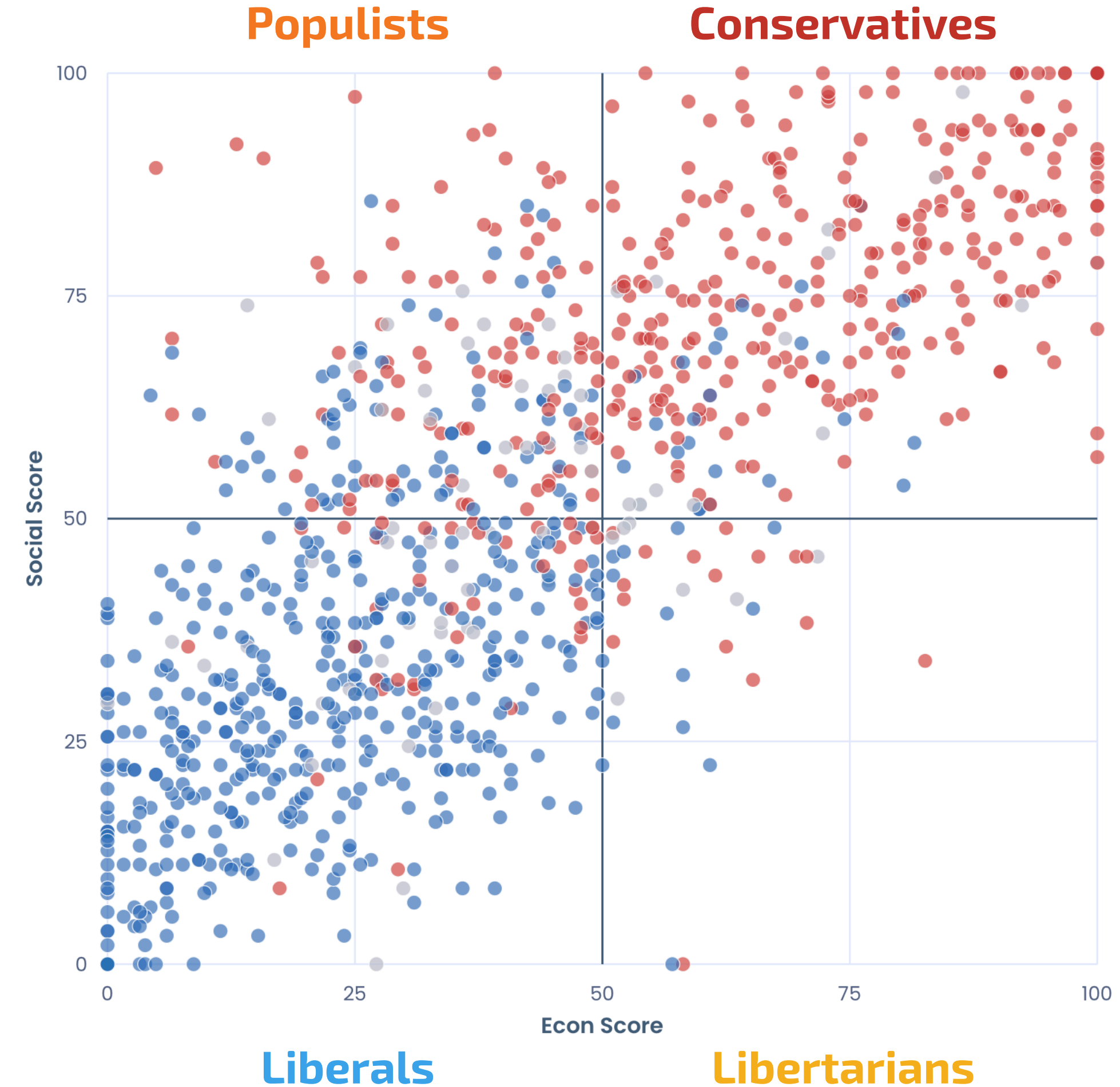
82% of Democrats are in the Liberal quadrant and 60% of Republicans are in the Conservative quadrant

- Republicans win the generic congressional ballot by a 83 point margin among Conservatives, Democrats win by a 75 point margin among Liberals.



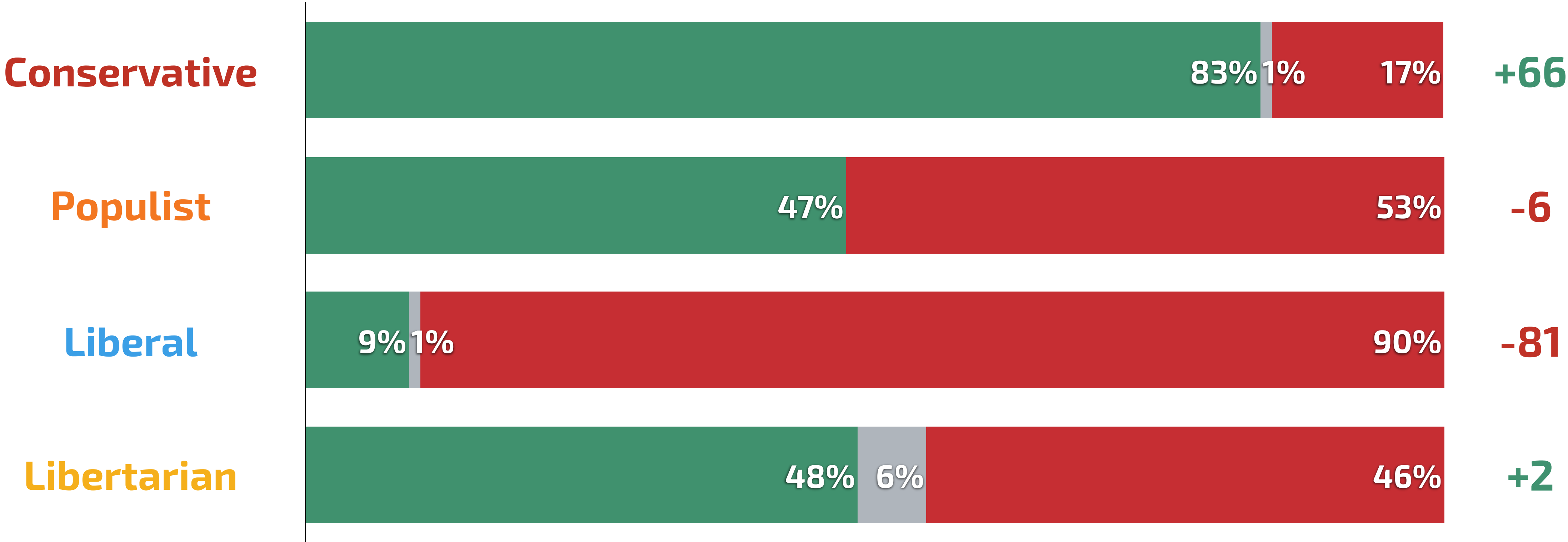

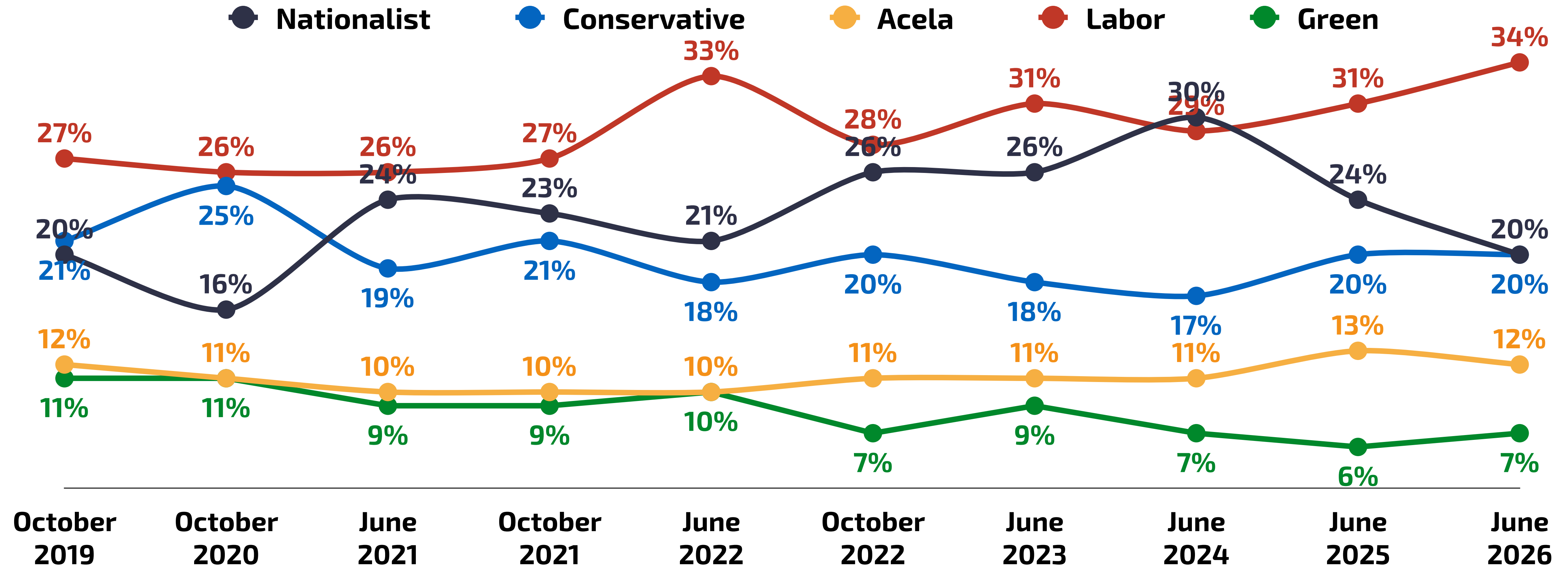

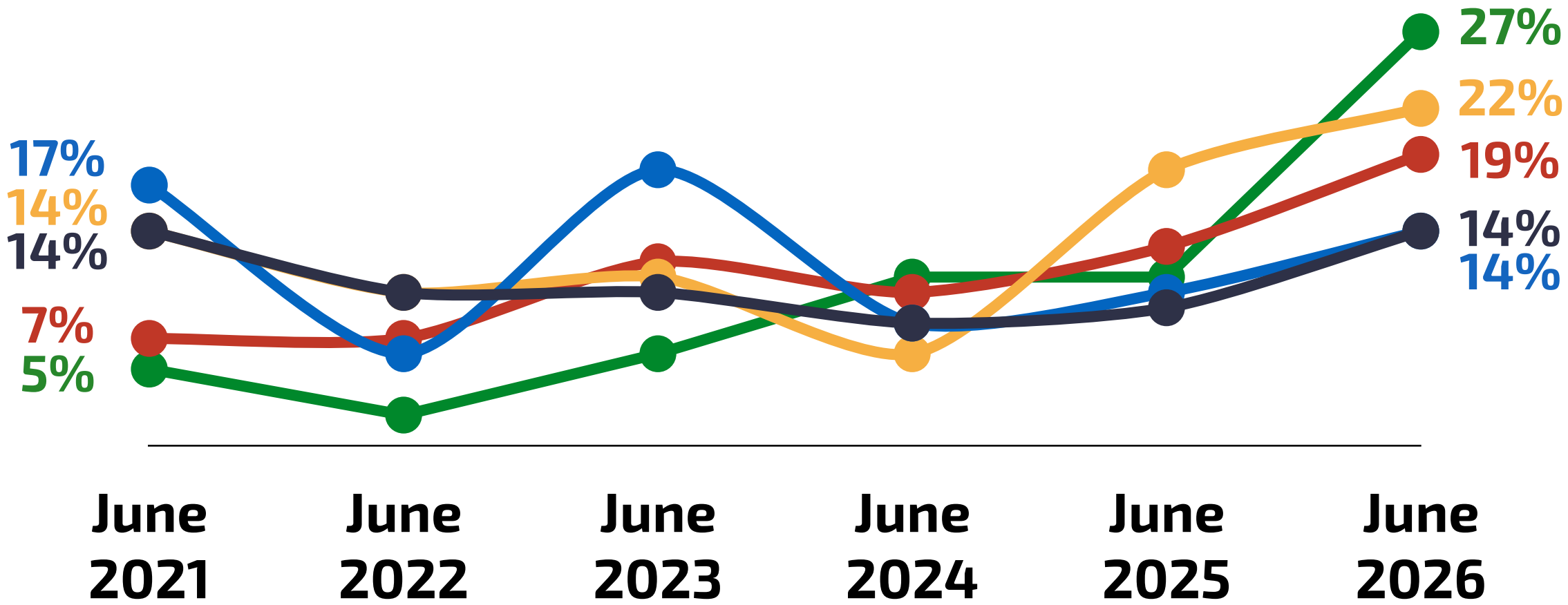

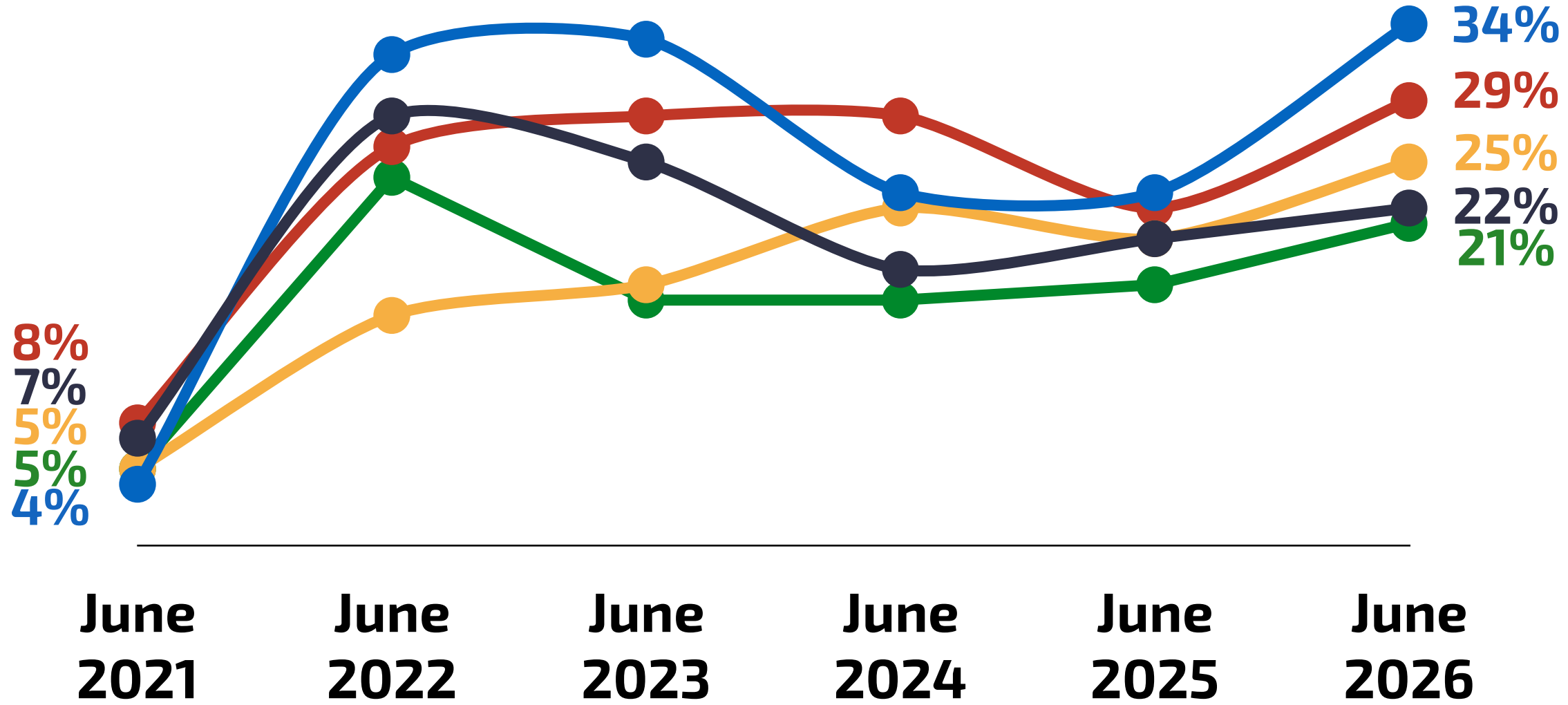

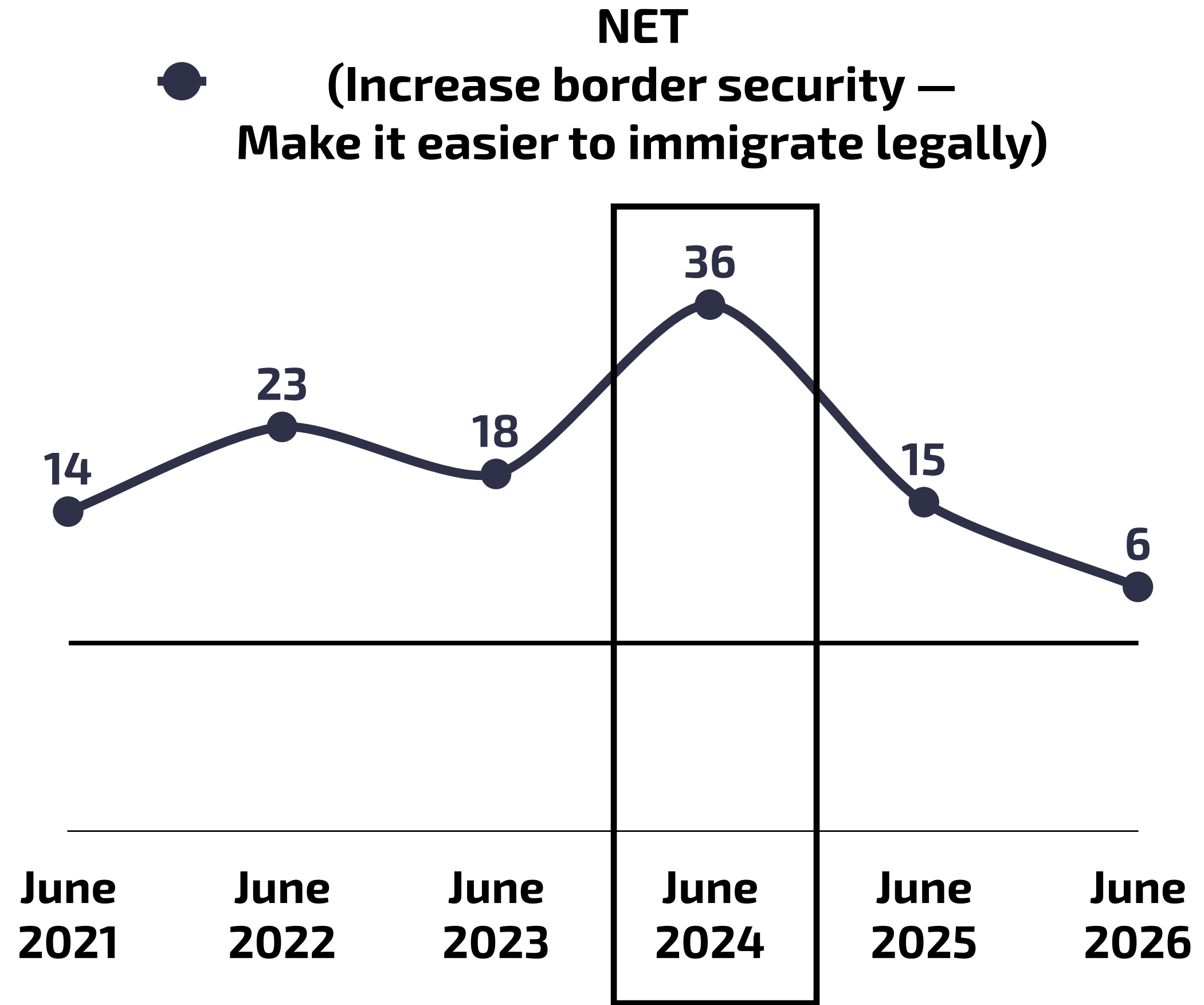
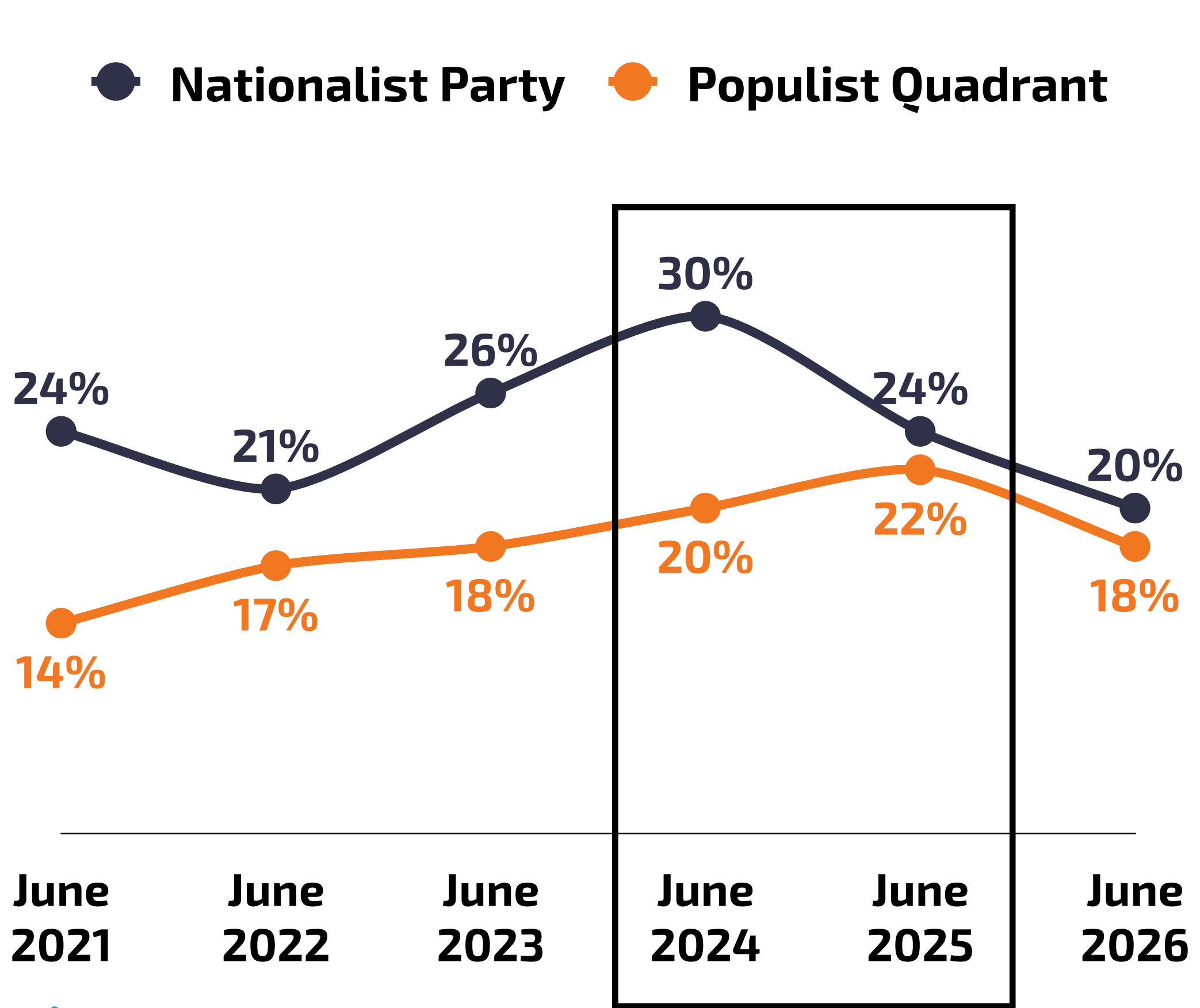


First Issue: Cost of Living

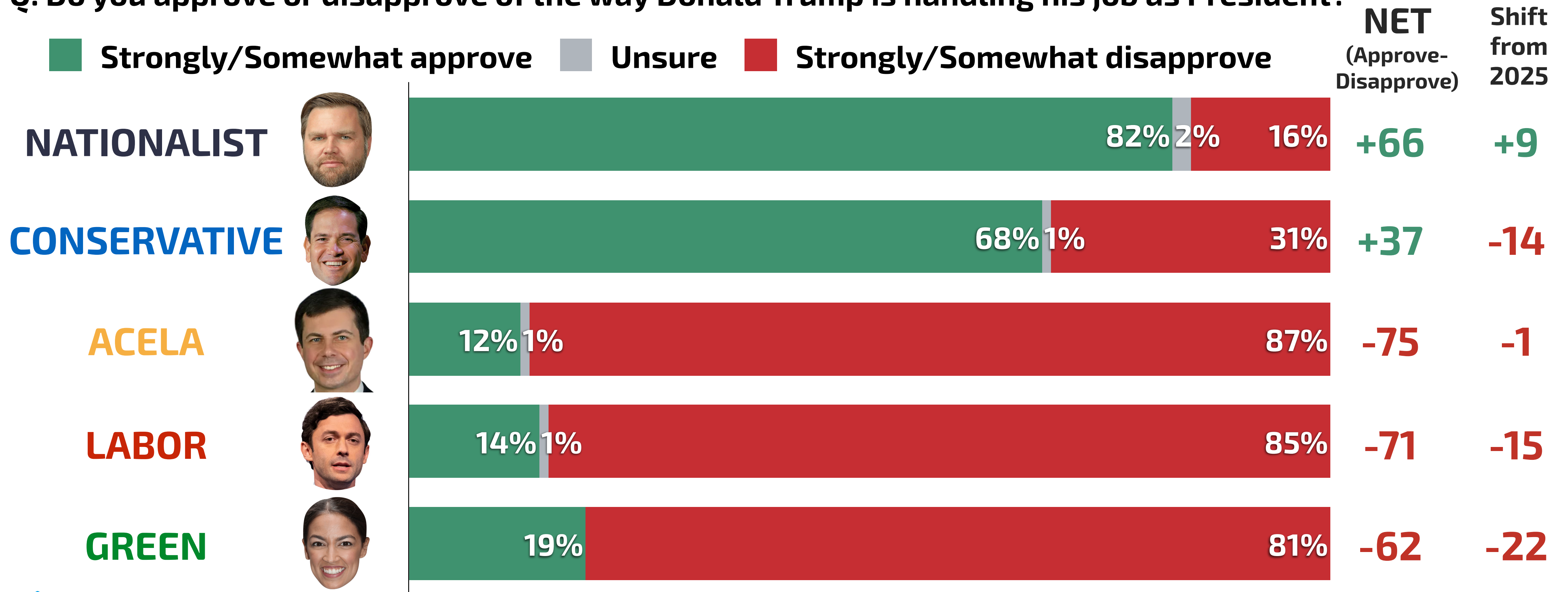

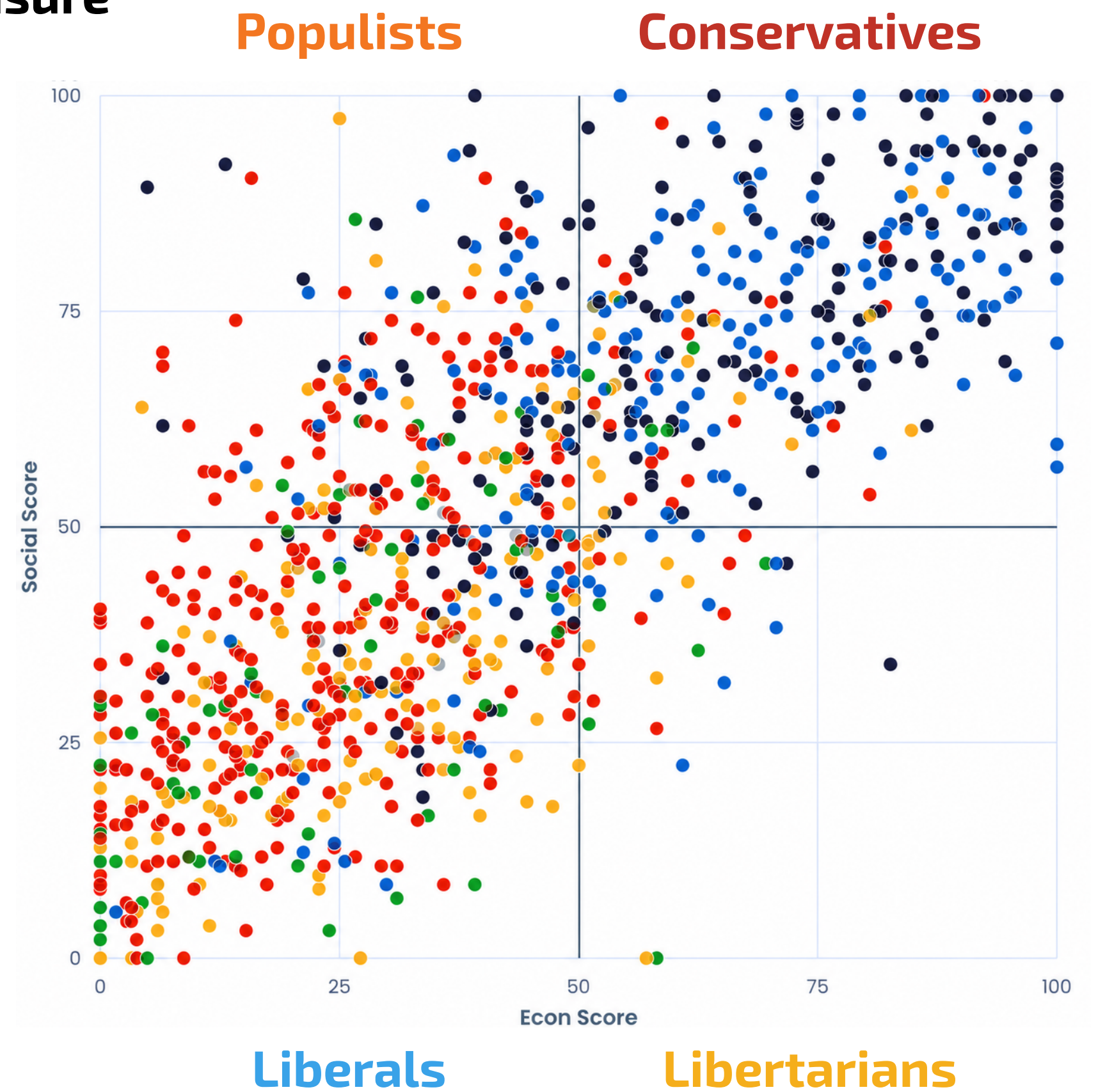
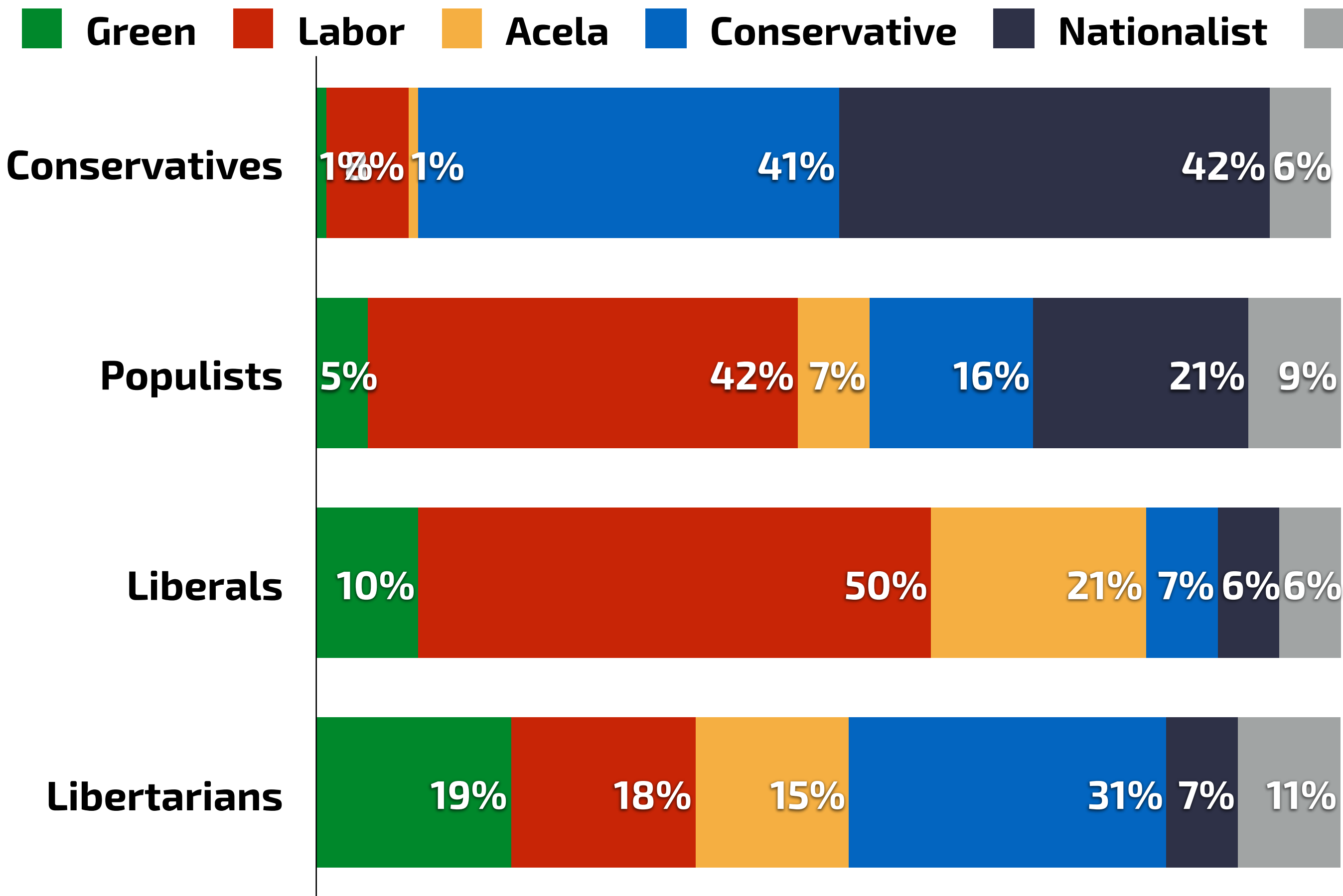

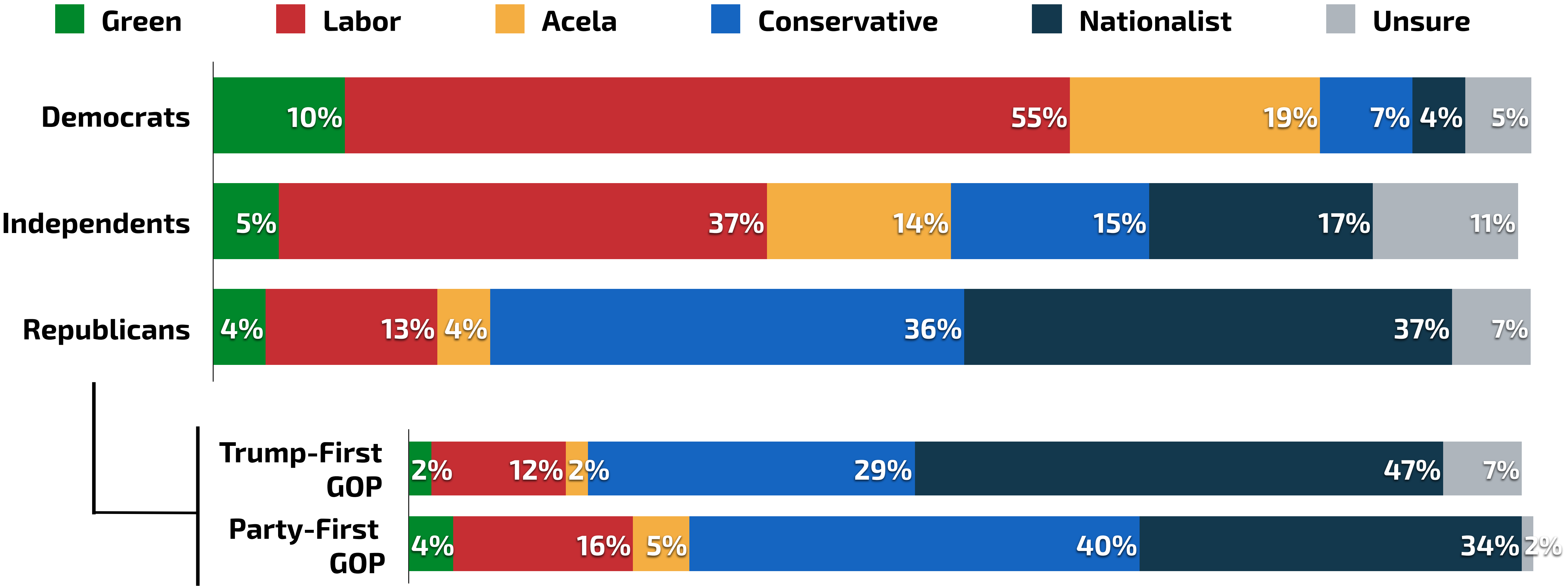

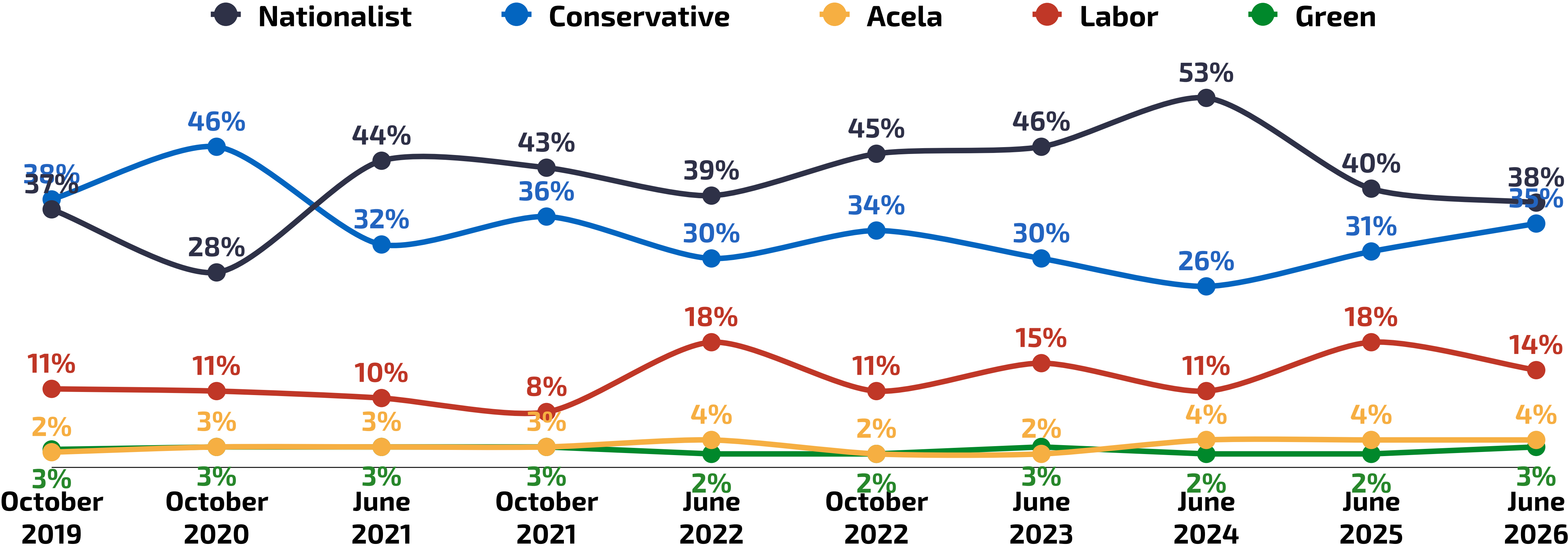
Nationalist Party wins among GOP, Labor with Democrats and Independents

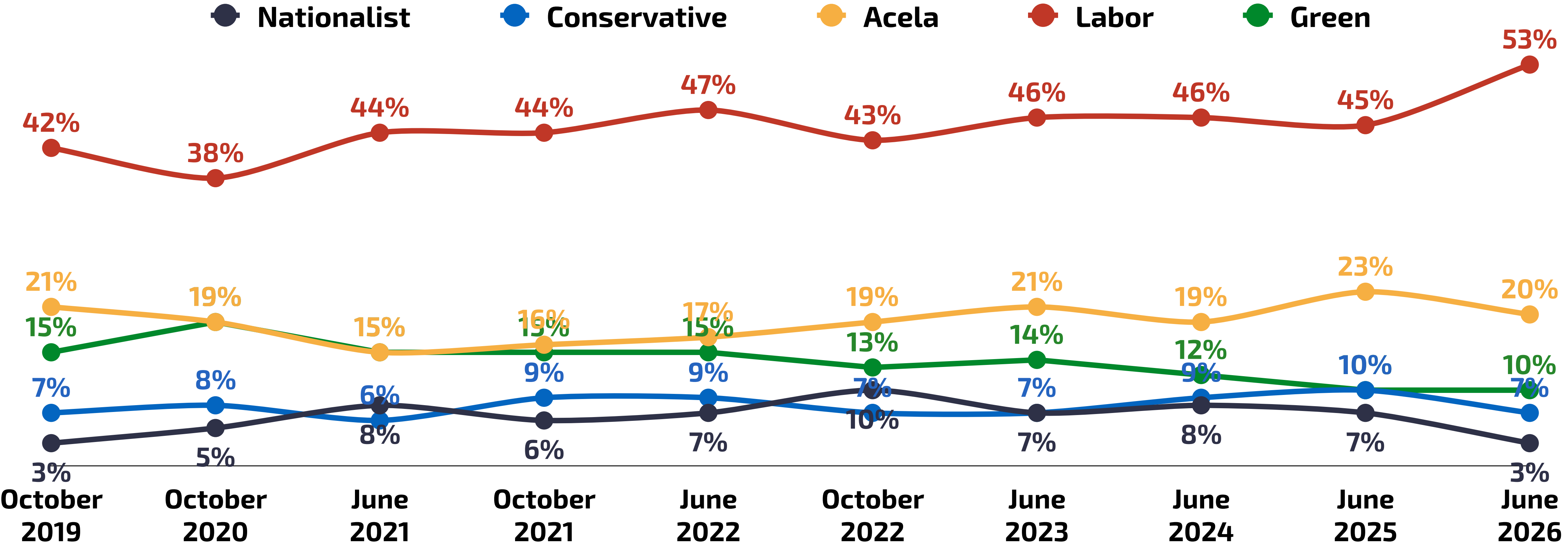

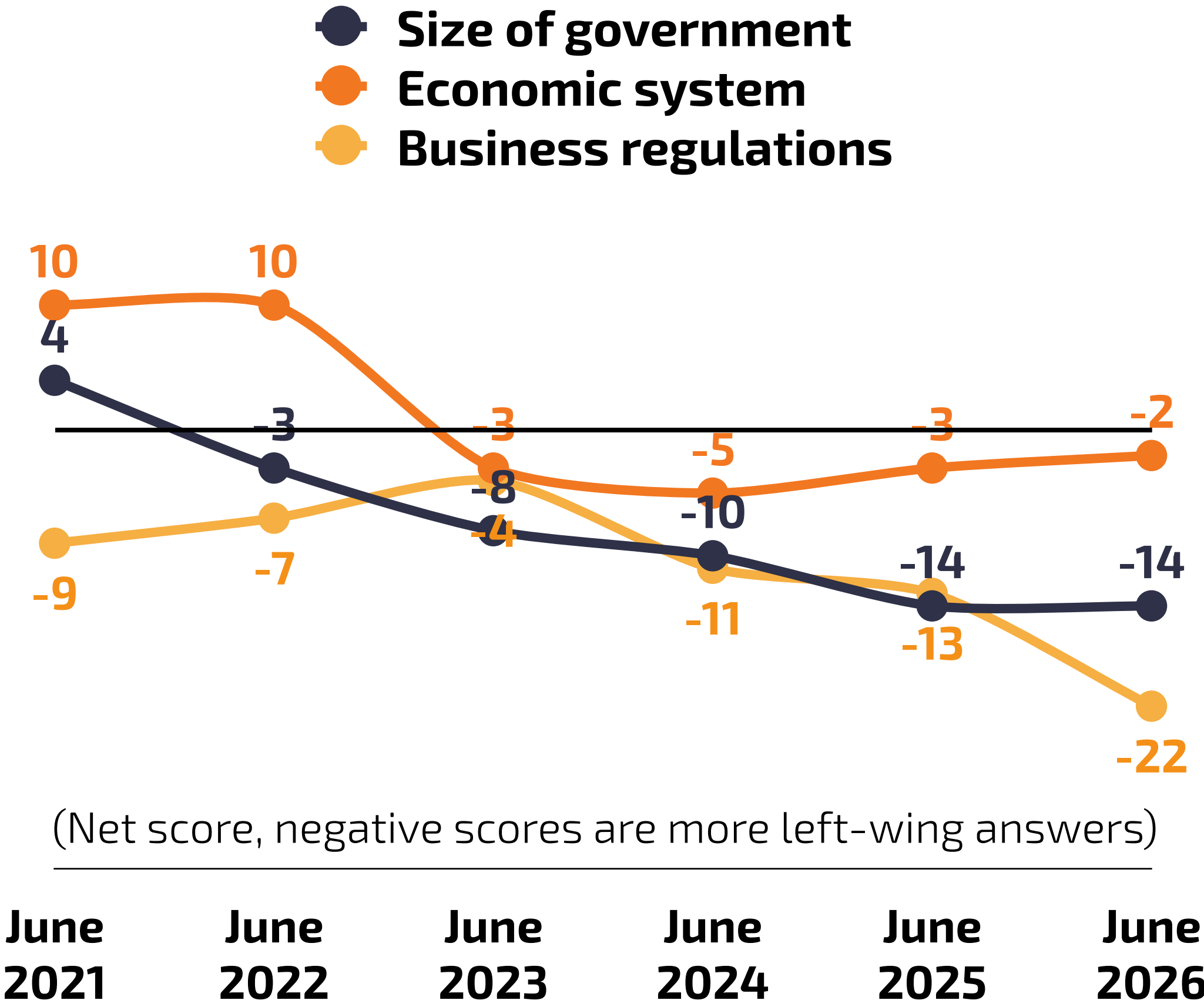

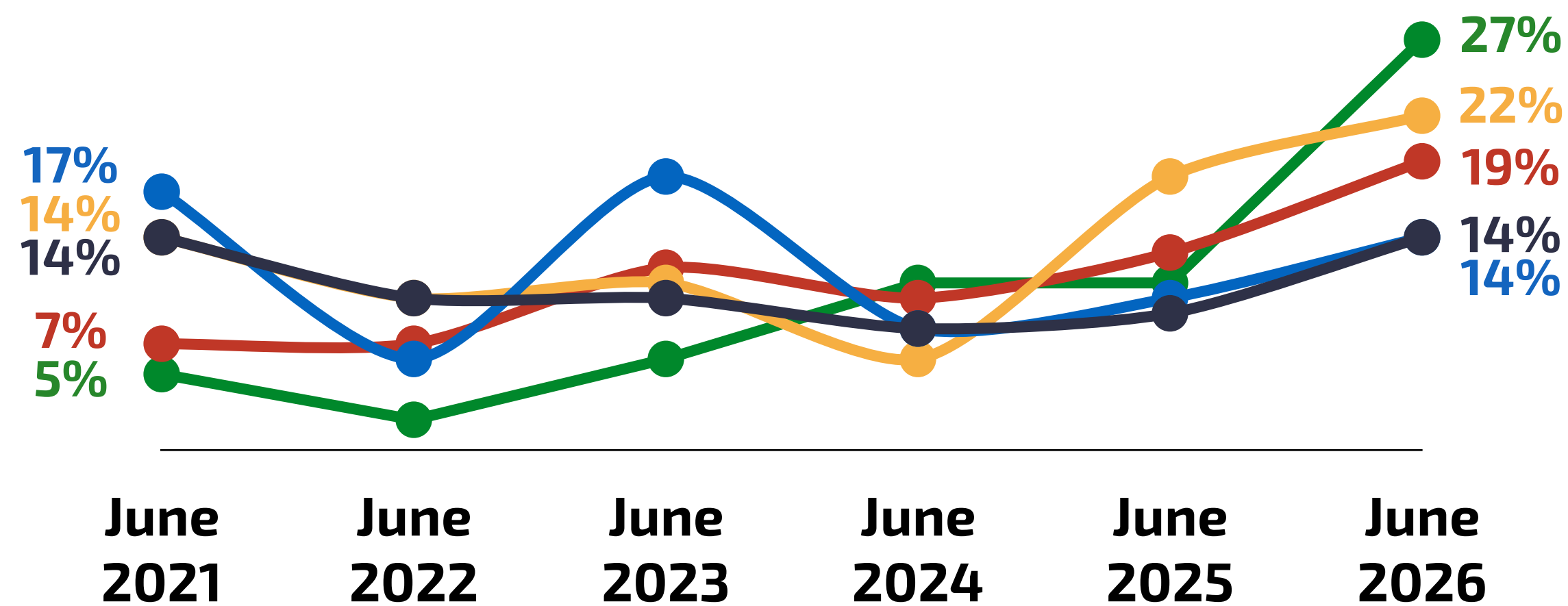

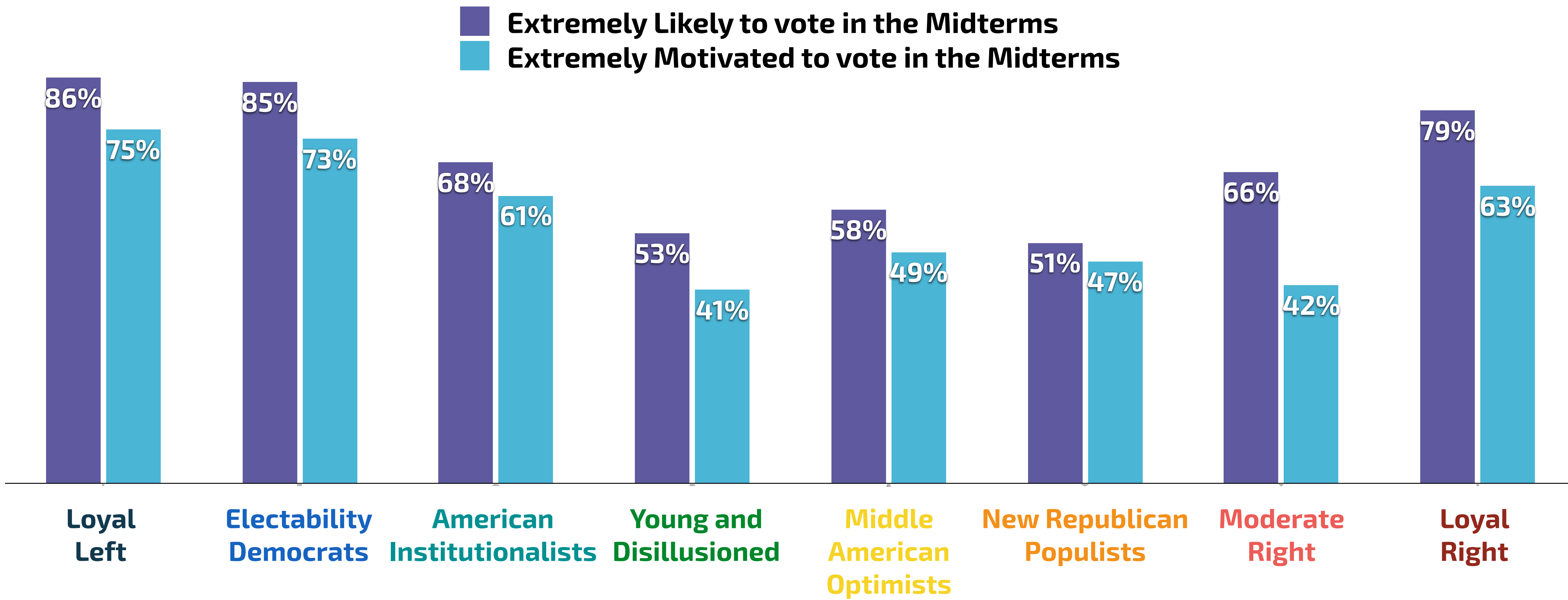
