








### Cultural conservatives outnumber cultural liberals 55-45, economic liberals outnumber economic conservatives 61-39




### 20% of voters are culturally conservative and economically liberal, while only 4% are culturally liberal and economically conservative









#### Populist & Conservative quadrants gain ground in 2024










# Quadrants by party identification


- The Conservative and Liberal quadrants are primarily populated with their respective partisans.
- Republicans (46%) are more common than Democrats (29%) in the Populist quadrant.








#### Plurality of populists are Republicans





### 69% of Conservatives identify as Republicans and 63% of Liberals identify as Democrats; higher numbers among Strong Liberals and Conservatives






# Quadrants by political ideology


- 70% of Conservatives identify as ideologically conservative, while only 58% of Liberals identify as ideologically liberal.
- 37% of Populists identify as conservative, while 18% identify as liberal.
  - However, a plurality (43%)
    identify as moderates, as do
    23% of Conservatives and 32%
    of Liberals.







## 11% Of Strong Conservatives and 17% of Strong Liberals identify as ideologically moderate






# 2024 presidential election


- If the 2024 presidential election were held today, Trump would win Populists by 10 points and lose Libertarians by 24 points.
  - At the same time last year, Trump was leading among Populists by 21 points and trailing among Libertarians by only 7 points
- Trump performs better with Strong Conservatives (95%) than Biden does with Strong Liberals (91%).
















# What if American elections had five parties instead of two?


- 84% of the Conservative quadrant supports either the Nationalist or Conservative Party, while 93% of the Strong Conservative quadrant supports those parties
- 47% of the Liberal quadrant supports the Labor Party; the Acela Party comes in second place at 22%.
- 36% of Populists support the Nationalist Party, and 55% of Strong Populists support them.







## Populists choose right-leaning parties over left-leaning parties by a 10 point margin






### 62% of Strong Conservatives support the Nationalists; Strong Liberals more likely to support the Greens or Acela than Liberals overall






#### Nationalist Party wins among GOP, Labor with Democrats and Independents






#### Nationalist Party has a strong lead both among Trumpfirst and Party-first Republicans



#### Nationalist support among GOP again reaches new high


